



## *St. Louis Post-Dispatch, Historical, 1874-1922*

At the turn of the 20th century, St. Louis was the fourth largest city in the United States, home to thousands of German and Irish immigrants, and a major crossroads for immigration. The historical *St. Louis Post-Dispatch* is a digital edition of a ground-breaking Midwestern newspaper, from 1874 to 1922.

Founded by Joseph Pulitzer, the *St. Louis Post-Dispatch* became known for its investigative reporting and human interest stories. Several well-known writers worked there, including Mark Twain, from 1874 to 1891.

This database allows researchers to click through these historical newspapers from cover to cover, viewing full-page images of articles and advertisements, and doing full-text searches.
